World Immunization Day is a global healthcare awareness event observed on the 10th of November every year. It is celebrated to raise awareness about the importance of vaccination. To mark this important day, students of Grades VIII performed a group activity and prepared the charts displaying vaccines, their importance, disease they protect us from, the correct age, mode of administration, and other relevant information.

Children's Day is a celebration that brings immense joy and excitement to every child's life. To mark this special occasion, Team IHS organized a vibrant and memorable celebration on 14th November within the school premises. The day was filled with enthusiasm, joy, and grandeur. As part of the celebration, the school

This prestigious recognition reflects the collective excellence, teamwork, and spirit of our delegation. **Ayushman Atrey** made a significant impact in the UNGA, impressing the judges with the well-researched points and confident presentation and was awarded Special Mention.

The evening session of the **Space Workshop- "Evening Rendezvous with the Sky"**—was successfully held on Saturday, November 16th. The workshop provided an incredible learning experience for students, where they explored the functioning of telescopes and gained insights into the science behind celestial phenomena. A highlight of the evening was the opportunity for students to observe the detailed structures of the Moon through a telescope, such as craters, dark maria (lunar seas), rugged mountain ranges, and intricate rilles and ridges, showcasing its dynamic and textured surface. They also observed the planets Saturn, and Venus through telescopes. This hands-on experience ignited their curiosity and deepened their understanding of the wonders of the cosmos. The session was truly a memorable journey into the mysteries of space, inspiring young minds to explore the universe beyond.

Kisan Diwas was celebrated on November 22nd to honor the contributions of farmers and their significant role in our society. Our students discussed the importance of farmers in society, challenges faced by farmers (e.g., climate change, water scarcity, pricing issues), technological advancements in agriculture, organic vs. conventional farming, the impact of agricultural policies on farmers' lives and role of youth in supporting agriculture.

On November 23, a **virtual exchange programme** was held to foster intercultural sharing, with a continued emphasis on school experiences and a special focus on cultural festivals. Jasmin Kaur and Reyansh got the opportunity to participate in it. The event brought together students from USA, Ghana, Sierra Leone, Germany, Ukraine, Tanzania, Uganda, Uzbekistan, India, Bangladesh, Malaysia and Taiwan to share and learn about each other's educational systems, traditions, and the significance of cultural festivals in their respective regions. They highlighted cultural festivals and the exchange focused on how different communities celebrate their cultural festivals, exploring their significance, rituals, and activities.

Geeta Mahotsav: The Antarrashtriya Geeta Mahotsav was celebrated with great enthusiasm through the Geeta Nibandh Competition.

In Science, students explored the concepts of sexual and asexual reproduction, as well as the distinction between oviparous and viviparous animals. They also studied the physical and hormonal changes that occur during adolescence, along with the roles and effects of hormones released by the endocrine system.
